Hamfesters VE Testing: By Al Bukowski N9ZD

Since I was out of town for the weekend, Tim AA9BV stepped in my place to administer the Amateur Radio exams. However, there were no candidates this past month April 14. I want to thank Tim and the other VE's dedicating their time helping at this Exam session.

If you or a friend are planning on taking an Amateur Radio examination, please remember that Hamfesters VE's conducts FCC authorized VEC tests for Technician, General, and Extra class licenses every month on the 2nd Saturday at Oak Forest City Hall 15440 S. Central Ave. Oak Forest, II 60452. City Hall Doors open at 9:00 AM. We begin testing at about 9:15 AM. Amateur Radio Exam signs are posted at the main entrance to direct you to the City Hall Chamber Room. We do ask that you park your car in the main parking lot between the Fire Department and the Police Department and not directly in front of the Main doors to City Hall. Walk-ins are welcomed: however an email to abukowski@sbcglobal.net informing me your intentions would be appreciated.

Very important: Please remember to bring the following items with you to any exam session: The appropriate fees (currently \$15) for the test. We urge you to bring exact amount of cash, a picture ID (ex: driver's license), the original and a copy of your signed valid Amateur Radio license if already licensed. A calculator if you would like to use one.

It is very important to have your Social Security Number, or a issued FRN (Federal Registration Number). You may use the FRN in place of your SSN because without either your SSN or FRN, the FCC will not process your application. If you are upgrading from a recent exam, it is essential to bring your valid CSCE and a copy showing proof of recent passed exam(s) if not already processed by the FCC.

Our next test session will be held on Saturday May 12, 2012.

Please note: If you are planning to take the Extra exam in the near future, please read the following. The present

Extra class pool questions and the present Extra class exams will no longer be given after June 30, 2012.

The NEW Extra class (Element 4) exams will be administered starting July 1, 2012. If you plan to take the New Extra exam after July 1, 2012, you should

Again - The test fee is still \$15.00 (<u>cash only</u> -- no credit cards, Money Orders or checks).



GROUND THAT MIC!

Many amateur radio stations experience RF that impedes their audio signals and causing garbled and distorted audio SSB - not sometimes enough for receiving stations to notice as they listen to a 3" speaker of a transceiver but careful listening in a wideband receiver with with high quality receiving equalizers and studio monitor speakers allow this interference to be heard. Then there are the signals that have major problems with RF getting into their audio lines causing all sorts of problems.

Heil Sound Laboratories have discovered a very interesting fact. Most of the major transceivers today do not ground their microphone shields - the mic shields float. One of the things to be learned about building RF transmitters with speech audio sections was to ground those shields. He is a simple fix from Heil that anyone can make to their rig and it's effective. It applies to 4 or 8 pin mic connectors.

Plug your microphone cable into the front panel of the transceiver. Remove the two small Phillips head screws and the cable clamp they hold. Then remove the tiny Phillips head screw that holds the rest of the metal sleeve. Slide that back



onto the mic cable. Cut off the end of a resistor about 3" long. Locate the mic pin that has the shield of the mic cable soldered to it. With a small iron, carefully solder this solid wire to that shield and pin. Bring the sleeve back up the cable and attach to the connector with the small screw. This leaves the solid wire coming out the back of the connector. Replace the cable clamp and as you do that, tightly wrap that solid wire around one of the Phillips head screws and tighten the clamp assembly.

What you have accomplished is grounding the shield to the transceivers chassis ground through the ring on the mic connector. This simple tip has been a big help to many stations with RFI problems.
