Hamfesters VE Testing: By Al Bukowski N9ZD

Hamfesters Radio club VE's were prepared to administer FCC Amateur Radio exams on Sept 8, 2012. However no candidates came to this session. The VE's who were present are: Gene KB9RNM, James KA2DRQ, Bob N9JYX, Kelvin W9BBQ, and Tim AA9BV who stepped in for me in my absence. Many thanks to all the VE's who have given the dedicated time at the Exam sessions.

If you or a friend are planning on taking an Amateur Radio examination, please remember that Hamfesters VE's conducts FCC authorized VEC tests for Technician, General, and Extra class licenses every month on the 2nd Saturday at Oak Forest City Hall 15440 S. Central Ave. Oak Forest, II 60452. City Hall Doors open at 9:00 AM. We begin testing at about 9:15 AM. Amateur Radio Exam signs are posted at the main entrance to direct you to the City Hall Chamber Room. We do ask that you park your car in the main parking lot between the Fire Department and the Police Department and not directly in front of the Main doors to City Hall. Walk-ins are welcomed: however an email to abukowski@sbcglobal.net informing me of your intentions would be appreciated.

Our next test session will be held on Saturday October 13, 2012.

Very important: Please remember to bring the following items with you to <u>any</u> exam session: The appropriate fees (currently \$15) for the test. We urge you to bring <u>exact amount of cash</u>, a picture ID (ex: driver's license), the original and a copy of your signed valid Amateur Radio license if already licensed. A calculator if you would like to use one.

It is very important to have your Social Security Number, or a issued FRN (Federal Registration Number). You may use the FRN in place of your SSN because without either your SSN or FRN, the FCC will not process your application. If you are upgrading from a recent exam, it is essential to bring your valid CSCE and a copy showing proof of recent passed exam(s) if not already processed by the FCC. The test fee is still \$15.00 (cash only -- no credit cards, Money Orders or checks).

Editors Ramblings

Do We Need Wide Rectangular Windows?

Now that the kids are getting settled back in school I wanted to write a bit about Eric KC9OOM's grade school science fair projects from a couple of years ago. I know you As it turns out the radio waves passed fairly easily through are thinking Uggh!, how boring, but bear with me as it does wood, insulation and ceramic tile. Of course, anything involves a fair amount of Ham radio and even a few unanswered questions.

In his first project, Eric wanted to see what materials radio waves would pass through. He came up with a system that I (being his dad) thought was pretty

signal through the scanner. Eric found a relatively simple design for an RF current probe to measure current through a coaxial cable. Simply, it consisted of a ferrite choke for inducing current, which was then passed through a rectifier circuit connected to a current meter. He got a lot of the materials at the Hamfest and we ordered the germanium diodes through the internet. We also bought some copper rods from ACE hardware for constructing two 440 megahertz antennas. He then needed a Faraday cage to keep the signals contained and this consisted of 2 milk crates covered in aluminum foil.




The material being tested was placed between the milk crates and the difference between the transmit signal and the receive signals could be found. Eric tested a lot of the building blocks that you would find in an ordinary wall. metal even a thin wire screen would completely block the transmission of radio waves. Interestingly, when the metal blocked the signal from leaving the Faraday cage, the transmit signal would increase in strength. Eric thought this was from reflection of the signal back into the antenna or clever. We have an HT and a scanner so he needed a way to (for all of the engineers out there) one of his judges measure the transmit signal through the HT and the receive suggested it formed a resonant cavity oscillator.

> The next year, Eric wanted to expand on this project so he decided to see what size and shapes of opening would most easily allow the passage of his 440 megahertz signals. He used the same set up, but this time he placed a piece of aluminum foil between the Faraday cages i.e. milk crates covered with foil. He would then cut openings of different sizes and shapes in the foil to see which ones the radio waves would most easily pass through by again measuring the current differences in the coax of the receive and transmit antenna.

> When Eric cut a square opening in the foil, he found that the signal would start to pass through when the square was 10.5 cm x 10.5 cm or about 15% of the wavelength of the 70 cm signal. The amount of signal passing through would then steadily increase as the size of the opening increased, as you would expect.

Eric also measured the amount of signal passing through circular openings. When he graphed it out, it appeared that the area of the opening was the most important factor. It seemed a square and a circle of about the same area would allow roughly the same amount of signal to pass. This can be seen in Eric's graph below




Eric then tested rectangles and his results were surprising, at least to me. He would test some rectangles that were taller than they were wide. For example one of the rectangles was 28 cm tall by 14 cm wide. He would then flip the rectangle 90 degrees and test it when it was wider than it was taller so it was now 14 cm tall by 28cm wide. Much more of the signal would pass through the rectangle that was wider than it was tall. For instance the average received coax current when the rectangle was 14 cm tall x 28 cm wide was 0.104, milliamps but it was only .04milliamps when the rectangle was 28cm tall x 14 cm wide.

In the graph, the blue line represents the vertical rectangles which let more signal through.



Now according to my understanding the antenna's we made are vertically polarized ground plane antenna's so I would have expected that more signal would have passed through the rectangle that was taller than it was wide. Instead, much more of the signal passed through the antenna that was wider than it was tall. I am not an electrical engineer or a physicist so I realize I might be missing something simple here.
