CQ Field Day de Jim Riley

For various reasons Field Day 2014 was down a bit from last year but we made it up with more bonus points than ever before. Despite the down year and the bad weather we still had a lot of fun.

This year's activities got started when I met Bob Koran N9JYX at the trailer the Wednesday night before and we brought it to my house to pick up the trailer station's antenna and all the masts.

For the first time in, well...ever, George Young N9VOK was not on site to supervise the rising of the sun. Despite that, the sun rose somewhere above the threatening clouds that continued to threaten all day. More on that later.



The usual suspects were there early and setup was underway. Kurt Pawlikowski WB9FMC got a head start on the 20meter CW station along with Ron Carlson KB9ZBN. He was done almost before the rest of us did anything but stare and the bare ground.

Speaking of rest, I got plenty as I slept until almost 0800 and got on site much later than I had wanted. Fortunately for me, the trailer showed up after I did and then we seriously got to work. First up was putting up the GOTA tent so Brian Davis W9HLQ and his happy crew could set up their station. Next, the masts for the trailer's folded dipole were erected under the direction of Ray Paschke NW9S and Wayne Strickland W9BBB. In due course, Al Bukowski N9ZD and his son Dave N9KPD put up the 20 meter digital station, Linas Matonis KC9PCP and Tim Szymanski KC9POS put together the VHF/UHF setup, Kerry Nelson AA9SB assembled the 40 meter CW station, and Bill "Pete" Peterson K9OWQ worked on six meters.

Lunch was provided by Cathy KC9NRH and Bob N9KWG Fleischmann along with Helen Pawlikowski's meatballs. Then it was time to operate. Here's how we got all those bonus points.

Kerry had submitted a press release which is good for the publicity bonus whether or not it gets published. Al scored us the Field Day message bonus the night before.

One of Worth's finest came to unlock the facilities in the pavilion. That's "worth" 100 points for a visit by a representative of a served agency.

We were set up in a public place, Altman Park, and we had a public information table. There's 200 more points for a total of 500 before we'd made one contact.

Four hundred points for operating four stations under emergency power were provided by Al's generator which powered his station, Kerry's, and Pete's. Jim Liston W9HSH brought his honkin' 10KW power plant on wheels that easily handled the GOTA, trailer, and 20 meter stations and could have powered the others plus several of the nearby residences on 115th St.

Shortly after lunch we were paid a visit by Illinois State Senator Bill Cunningham who scored us 100 points for a visit by an elected official. We also claimed 100 points for educational activity because we really schooled him in Amateur Radio. In addition, Bill made our first two GOTA contacts.

While Bill was doing that, Tim and his crew got us our alternate power bonus with five solar power contacts.



As FD continued we garnered our 100 youth participation points, one operator made 20 GOTA contacts good for 20 points, and we submitted our scores electronically. That's good for fifty more points.

The biggest news of all? Tim finally made a satellite contact! That's right, after years of trying, we finally got the satellite bonus thanks to Tim's efforts. Eric KC9OOM also made a satellite contact via the International Space Station. Awesome work, guys.

That's a total of 1470 bonus points.

Those threatening skies I mentioned earlier? They stopped threatening and started delivering early in the evening even as rainbows appeared in the eastern sky. Somewhere between four and five a.m. they delivered again with a windy storm that brought down half the GOTA tent. Fortunately, Gene Phillips W9PNG had secured the station under tarps covered by chairs. After the storm he and I had the tent back up and the equipment operating in about an hour.

That equipment included Brian's usual Yaesu rig but this year he added a SDR setup and a really cool studio mic. The SDR was a big hit and almost no one used the Yaesu.

Ed Broniarczyk WA9EOL provided his usual Sunday morning breakfast to the overnight crew and then it was time to make some final contacts.

We started breaking down about 11 a.m. and were out of there before 2 p.m.

Thanks to Ron Kalat KB9TCX for policing the area and making sure it was better than we found it.

Altogether, we worked all fifty states, 81 of 83 ARRL sections, two U.S. territories, seven foreign countries, and four continents (North and South America, Oceania and Europe). Our farthest contact was New Zealand.

This year's top operator award goes to Kurt WB9FMC for making 369 CW contacts. Our top phone op was Eric KC9OOM with 125, and Al N9ZD led the digital ops with 86.

We do ask that you park your car in the main parking lot between the Fire Department and the Police Department and not directly in front of the Main doors to City Hall.

Our next test sessions will be held at the Will County Fairgrounds - The Hamfester's Hamfest Sunday August 3, 2014 starting 8:00AM.

Then again the following Saturday at Oak Forest City Hall on August 9, 2014 at 9:00AM.

Please note: We are now using the new <u>NCVEC</u> Question Pool 2014-2018 Technician Class, Element 2 Exams that started July 1, 2014. (*Please review the new question pool*)

Special instruction note: It is very important to bring the following items to any exam session: The appropriate test fee (currently \$15), A picture ID (driver's license or Student ID Card etc), a calculator if you would like to use one. And it's very important to have your Social Security Number, or if you are licensed, please use the FRN (Federal Registration Number) listed on your license. If you are upgrading, Please bring you're Amateur Radio license and a copy and any issued CSCE and a copy showing proof of recent passed exam(s) if not already processed by the FCC. If you have any questions regarding our test session or about upgrading, please contact N9ZD via e-mail at: N9ZD@arrl.net.

Walk-ins are welcome and again the test fee is \$15.00 (cash only -- no credit cards or checks).
